## **Company** closes site after bacteria located

Liberty Mutual: No Legionnaires' symptoms reported

Liberty Mutual Insur-ance Co. has closed its Wilmington Road build-ing for two days after detecting legionella bac-teria on the premises. The bacteria is respon-sible for Legionnaires're-ported disease, according to the Centers for Dis-ease Control and Preven-tion. The company said no employees have no employees have reported symptoms relat-ed to the disease.

Employees were notified by telephone and text message Thursday might that the building would be closed yesterday and today. In a statement released yesterday, the company said, "While conducting regular HVAC (heating, ventilation and air conditioning) system maintenance and testing, one water sample taken from the water cooling tower located on the roof of the building came back

the water cooling lower located on the roof of the building came back positive with legionella bacteria. "This bacteria can be found occurring naturally in environments that contain warm water such as HVAC cooling towers and large plumbing systems. Based on this test result, we believe the prudent action was to close the building and conduct further testing." Liberty Mutual said it immediately contacted the state and county boards of health "to ensure we follow all

ensure we follow all required reporting and

required reporting and testing procedures." It added that because there have been no employee reports of health symptoms the county board of health will monitor the situation "and has advised us that we are taking all appropriate measures in this situation."

The company said it has notified employees

has notified employees of the closure and will continue to provide them with updated reports as it receives more informa-

tion.

Employees were given a number to call for further information. Updated information was expected to be provided to employees by this afternoon.

## Marcellus production rising faster than predicted

Pennsylvania, W. Va. numbers up 50 percent compared with last year

PITTSBURGH (AP) - Mar-PHISBURGH (AP) — Mar-cellus Shale natural gas pro-duction is rising even faster this year than energy experts had predicted, and that's hav-ing a national impact on ener-

gy.

said 2013 production in Pennsylvania and West Virginia is
up about 50 percent compared
with last year.

That yearly number trans lates into the equivalent of about 550 million barrels of

oil. official mid-2013 produc-tion figures for Pennsylvania and West Virginia haven't been released yet by those states, but Bentek's figures are consid-ered very reliable by govern-

Figures for the pipelines that take gas out of the Marcellus show that in the first six months of the year, Pennsylvania produced about 1.5 trillion cubic feet of gas, with projections for a year-end total of about 3.2 trillion cubic feet.
